

ioneering photographer Eadweard Muybridge shocked the world in 1878 by capturing time in motion. In doing so, he revealed what had always been assumed, but never seen: The asymmetrical, four-beat gait that enables a horse to momentarily 'fly' when all feet are off the ground. With his ingenious high-speed shutter and trigger invention, Muybridge was, for the first time, able to clearly frame moments in a snapshot of movement.

Love Black Country believes God is increasingly at work reimagining the immense, divine possibilities of 'togetherness' in our region and believe that also, this will bring transformative change.

For more than 30 years we have witnessed the Lord doing exceptional things in the Black Country. With these efforts we have participated in building bridges across the Midlands with the Mission Mercia initiative.

Boroughs

Wolverhampton

since early 2023, we've been reestablishing a diverse team in Wolverhampton, comprising church, youth, kids' leaders, creatives, business people, and prayers. The original 2014 team evolved over time, leading to a pause to foster a new 'Love Wolverhampton' expression. As 2024 approaches, we're excited to watch this unfold further.

Dudley

Leaders' Breakfast unites church and charity leaders from all denominations. It help foster relationships, give support, and allows opportunity to stay informed about Dudley. In March 2023, 'The Faith Experiment' explored the intersection of science and faith. Love Dudley also partnered with Saltmine Theatre Company to host 'The Liberator' in early 2023.

Walsall

ove Walsall is aiming for spiritual, social, economic, and ecological transformation of the town through unity. By encouraging local churches to work together and listen to God, we envision a glorified Walsall. Our core activities include listening to God through our monthly Core Team meetings, youth engagement and uniting for traditional Christian festivals like the Easter passion play, gathering up to 1000 people in Walsall town centre.

Sandwell

In the last year, Love Sandwell facilitated monthly gatherings for church leaders and chaplains, fostering relationships and support. Responding to their needs, we introduced Sandwell Leaders' lunch for ministers, alongside an informal dropins for the wider Christian community. Venue locations varied across Sandwell, and ongoing research explores church needs for children and young people.
